Definition - Tableau:

A tableau is a frozen snapshot of a compelling moment in a story.

Components of a Tableau:

- 1. Vivid facial expressions
- 2. Different levels in space (low to the ground, mid-height, and up high)
- 3. Character relationships

- Select a historical figure you've been studying. Consider an important moment in their life and re-create that moment by creating a solo statue or group tableau.
 Examples could include:
 - MLK's march on Washington or his "I have a dream" speech
 - o The Wright Brother's first flight in 1903
 - o Rosa Parks refusal to give up her seat on the bus
 - o Babe Ruth hitting a home run

Step 2: Create a science-based tableau!

- ☐ Use your body and facial expressions to create a tableau that illustrates how to decrease temperature.
 - Scenario: You are outside on a hot day, and your ice cream starts melting! Create a tableau to depict this scene.
 - ☐ Part of the tableau should identify/illustrate the heat source that is causing your ice cream to melt.
 - Share with your family (at home) or friends (perhaps in virtual space!) and discuss.
 - NEXT: Adjust your tableau to demonstrate what you could do to slow down the
 melting of your ice cream. What could you do to make your ice cream melt less
 quickly? Create your tableau, share, and discuss again!
